NOW WHAT

Transform the fireplace into the room's focal point by installing a ledge that makes the misalignment of the television and fireplace seem deliberate.

Anchor this area with a vase and a custom floating bench.

Arrange the existing seating to form a conversation area.

Dress the bare walls with custom-made minimalist art that incorporates tan, which will complement the orange seating.

Paint two walls gray to warm up the room.

Hang the TV on an articulated arm so it can be angled for watching TV on the sofa or playing Wii in another corner.
